Texts, Types, and Purposes

- Write <u>arguments</u> focused on <u>discipline-specific content</u>. (CCSS.ELA-Literacy.WHST.11-12.1)
 - a. Analysis of claim(s)- Intro, significance, alternate or opposing claims, organization that logically sequences the claim(s), counterclaims, reasons, and evidence. CCSS.ELA-Literacy.WHST.11-12.1a
 - b. Develop claim(s)/counterclaims fairly and thoroughly, supplying relevant data/evidence for each while pointing out the strengths and limitations of both claim(s) and counterclaims in a discipline-appropriate form that anticipates the audience's knowledge level, concerns, values, and possible biases.  - c.
